The adults in the class are looking forward to settling down into a normal week next week, we will be writing

non-chronological reports about the life of Julius Caesar in English. In Maths we will be continuing to look at addition and estimating. In Topic we will be looking at the changes the Romans made to life in Britain.

Year 5 have enjoyed their first week back after the holidays.

We have been writing a recount of interesting days and events during the holidays, thinking carefully about their vocabulary, punctuation and using determiners. In maths we have been squaring and cubing numbers and revising factors and multiples. On Wednesday the class had the opportunity to watch Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone at Brannel School's cinema. It was amazing watching it on the big screen. Next week we will be using the story telling approach to tell and remember the story of Harry Potter. We will also be starting to make lanterns in preparation for the torchlight carnival later this month.

Pentewan Class

This week, Year 6 have made a great start to the half term by completing the 2018 SATs papers. These results have reflected the progress which has been made across last half term and helped to identify gaps in the childrens' understanding. Alongside this, the children have been writing 'spooky stories' which they read out to the rest of the class on Thursday in a very enjoyable session of sharing. In science, the children have been learning about how light travels; how we see; and the properties of different materials in relation to transparent, translucent and opaque. In topic, the children have explored the major developments and changes during the Industrial Revolution of Great Britain. In addition to all of this, Year 6 experienced their first session of Rugby on Friday, which was delivered by an instructor from England Rugby. Next week, we are looking forward to beginning our work on fractions, fiction writing linked to the Titanic and continuing our bridge projects
